1919	B.P published "Aids to Scout Mastership". 25 th July,1919 permanent training centre for Scout Masters at Gilwel Park was opened. From 8 th to 19th September,1919 first HWB course was conducted here.
1930	Lady B.P became 'World Chief Guide'. World Guide flag was adopted. Designed by Frokh Kari Aas of Norway.
8 th January 1941	B.P died in Kenya. Military Funeral was given. He was buried at Nyeri in Kenya

- 4. Now write on the chart what they shared under 'K'
- 5. Now ask them what they want to know and give time to write.
- 6. Now tell them to share.
- 7. Write all the question under 'W' on the chart.
- 8. Now teacher has open discussion on all the question asked by the students.
- 9. Now ask the students what they have learned.
- 10. Write under 'L' what they have learnt.



What is National Integration



ORGANISATION OF WAGGGS

WAGGGS: The World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts is the largest voluntary movement dedicated to girls and young women in the world. Works as a democratic and non-governmental organisation. Our diverse Movement represents ten million girls and young women from 150 countries.

HISTORY OF WAGGGS

The first World Conference held in England, in 1920. It was a historic occasion that gave representatives of the Girl Guiding and Girl Scouting world the opportunity to meet and exchange ideas and experiences. It heightened, strengthened and raised awareness about the movement. As the Movement grew and expanded, all the representatives felt the need to create something more solid and binding. Thus the idea of forming a world association was proposed in the fourth World Conference in 1926 at New York. Then Lord B.P ask all the members of the WAGGGS to consider the proposal. Delegates from 26 countries met at fifth International conference in Hungary in 1928, and formed The World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts, with a World Bureau as its secretariat to be located in London, replacing an advisory body, which created in the International Council in 1919.

AIM OF WAGGGS

i) Empowering Girls and Young Women as dynamic, flexible and value based training

ii) To give innovative high quality, non-formal educational programmes and international opportunities.

- iii) Leadership quality development.
- iv) Advocacy work
- v) Community action
- vi) To develop skills
- vii) Confidence needed to make positive changes in their lives, communities and countries.
- vii) Contributes to world peace and understanding.

MISSION OF WAGGGS

To enable girls and young women to develop their fullest potential as responsible citizens of the world.

VISION OF WAGGGS

All girls are valued and take action to change the world.

GOVERNANCE OF WAGGGS

1) <u>WORLD CONFERENCE</u>: It is a policy and decision making body of the WAGGGS. Meeting once in three years in different parts of the World. It safeguards the fundamental principles of the Movement. All Member Organizations are invited to send two delegates to the conference who vote on policies and standards for the following three years. Beside that a number of observers depending on membership can attend.

2) <u>WORLD BOARD</u>: It is made up of 12 ACTIVE WAGGGS members from around the world who are democratically elected by all Member Organizations at the World Conference. Among them six retires in every World Conference. Beside that each region elects a Chair at their Regional Conference every three years. These five regional Chairs also sit in the World Board. The World Board meets at least once a year, at Olave Centre.

3) <u>WORLD BUREAU</u>: It is the secretariat of WAGGGS. It provides services between WAGGGS & National Organizations working towards Membership, supporting to prepare Associate & Full membership, assist with overall planning, coordination & implements decisions taken at World Conferences, World Board and Committee meetings.

WAGGGS USE THREE OFFICIAL LANGUAGES: English, French, Spanish.

MEMBERSHIP

- a) FULL MEMBERSHIP:
 - i) Adhere the principle of membership of WAGGGS.
 - ii) Well developed Organisation.
 - iii) Constitution approved by World Board.
 - iv) Pay annual full membership quota to WAGGGS.
 - v) Send annual report to the World Bureau.

vi) Full members can decide & discuss on financial issues. Nominates & elect to serve World Board & Task committees. Vote for next venue.

b) ASSOCIATE MAMBERSHIP;

- i) Working towards full membership. Pay annual associate membership.
- ii) They can attend World Conference, vote for venue and they can nominate only. Beside that they cannot do anything.

GOALS OF WAGGGS

- GOAL-1: To offer all girls and young women the opportunity of being Girl Guides/Girl Scouts as part of a World Organisation.
- GOAL-2: To promote dynamic education programmes and leadership Training in a changing world.
- GOAL-3: To involve young women at all levels of decision making.
- GOAL-4: To continue to be recognised as the leader of world wide Developmental organisation of Girls and young women.

ROLE OF YOUNG WOMEN IN WAGGGS

- 1. Assuming responsibility in the decision making process.
- 2. The voice of young women being heard worldwide as the voice of WAGGGS.

3. The contemporary programmes relevant to tomorrow's girls and young women.

4. Women of WAGGGS has transformed the lives of girls and women worldwide. They are supporting and empowering them to achieve their fullest potential and to become responsible citizens of the world.

5. They provide innovative non formal educational programmes, leadership development, advocacy work and community action.

6. They empowering girls and young women to develop the skills and confidence needed to make positive changes in their lives, in their communities and countries.

7. WAGGGS is a dynamic organisation, through responsibility invested in the Member organisations and regions; an effective structure, and ability to manage change.

8. They have continuous development and advancement and flexibility, and utilizing new technology, in line with emerging trends.

WORLD CENTRES

1. OUR CHALET

In 1929. the World Committee of WAGGGS met Holland in and decided that а World Centre should be built for Girl Guides all and Girl Scouts to stav. Immediately Mrs Helen Storrow. agreed to donate the



money for the construction. It was a gift of Mrs Helen Storrow, a leading member of the Girl Scout of USA and for sometime Chairman of the World Committee. On 31st July 1932, Our Chalet was formally opened by World Chief Guide Olave Baden- Powell, Mrs Helen Storrow, almost all the villagers and Girl Guides and Girl Scouts of all over the World were present.

"Our Chalet" stands on a mountain slope across the valley from the little village of the Adelboden in Switzerland. The Squirrel was chosen as Our Chalet's new logo in 1994. Because Squirrel were its first inhabitants. The Squirrel symbolizes the outdoor focus of the programmes, fun and youthful nature of the centre. It conduct skiing in the winter and trekking and climbing in summer.

In 1986, our Chalet hosted the first HELEN STORROW Seminar in memory of the founder of world centre. These Seminars still held today and focus on international education an awareness.

Our Chalet was the first world centre to launch its own website on World Thinking day in 1998.

2. PAX-LODGE

Past and Present of Pax – Lodge:

There are three world centres Our Ark(1939), Olave House(1959) and Pax Lodge(1991).

OUR ARK: By



1930, more than one million girls and young women had already joined the girl guiding and girl scouting movement. Many people recognized that guides and scouts visiting London needed a

place to stay, so in 1937 the World Board agreed that a new World Centre would be established next door to the World Bureau.

Our Ark was officially opened on 2nd May, 1939. Its door remained open throughout the Second World War, in that time it served as a safe home for international guides and scouts.

OLAVE HOUSE: As the girl guiding and girl scouting movement, World Bureau and World Centre grew again there was a need for bigger house. WAGGGS decided to ask all the members to raise money. Canadian girls guides and American girl scouts contributed by sponsoring bricks and English guides raised money for the

Garden. During its silver jubilee ceremony in 1963, Our Ark was renewed "Olave House" in honour the of Lady B.P. Lady B.P herself presided over the ceremony.

PAX LODGE: In 1978, plan was made to reconnect Olave House and World Bureau as a part of Olave Centre project. The project selected a plot in a neighbourhood of suburb of Hampstead, which is renowned for its artistic and literacy connections. The World Bureau was officially opened on 15th February 1985.

But the Centre name was renamed as "PAX LODGE" as attributed to Lord B.P. Latin meaning of PAX is peace and present name of their home in England is PAX and PAXTU in Kenya.

Foundation stone laid by the daughter of Lord and Lady B.P., Mrs Bety Clay. Pax Lodge door was donated by Baden Powell family, to symbolize that the door is open to all women and girls. On 15th March 1991, her royal Highness Princess Bendikte of Denmark of Denmark officially opened Pax Lodge.

3. OUR CABANA

At а Guider Conference at Hawana, Cuba in 1946,the idea of a Guide house in Western Hemisphere was born. On February 22nd 1956 the dedication of Our Cabana the in presence of Lady B.P was celebrated.



On that day Lady B.P donated the steel door in deep blue colour with a huge world Trefoil of brass door (The Chief's Door). Behind this door lies a place with beautiful gardens where friendships start and strengthen. Our Cabana was opened officially in July 1957. Juliette Low World Friendship Fund played the role of fairy God Mother. Two programmes are the speciality of the Cabana, the wide game and village service project.

Our Cabana is building its own traditions. Each year the thinking Day Tree, "Polo Prietio", near the entrance is covered with white the blossoms, on 22nd of February, just as it was on the dedication ceremony on the Thinking Day in 1956.

The tree is the symbol of the city of Cuernavaca where Our Cabana is situated. We have adopted the symbol and made it relevant to Guiding. The roots that reached deep into the soil represent the roots of the soil represent the roots of the Girl Guiding and Girl Scouting. The Trunk represent the World Wide Movement and the strength of the organisation. The three branches represent the three parts of the Promise. The water flowing into the tree has two meanings. As a pre-Hispanic (Spanish speaking country) symbol of communication it represents communication with the city of Cuernavaca. As an Aztec (advanced civilisation of Mexican before the conquest by Cortes) symbol of life, it represents the fact that life is flowing into our organisation.

4. SANGAM

Sangam, WAGGGS fourth World Centre was first imagined at the 1956 WAGGGS International Commissioners meeting in New Delhi. The idea to build the World Centre in the Asia Pacific Region was proposed. A year later, at the World conference, decision to build the new centre in India was finalised, thanks to the determination and hard work of Lakshmi Mazumdar, National Commissioner of India, Bharat Scouts & Guides, and the state of Maharastra's generous donation of 7.3/4 acres of land to be used as World Centre site. The city of Pune, was selected because of its temperature, climate, rich culture, history, strong traditions in education and proximity to Mumbai. The meaning of SANGAM in Sanskrit is "GOING TOGETHER".

The foundation stone was laid in 1964 by Dame Leslie Whatley, D.B.E of the World Bureau. The Chief Guide Lady B.P ceremonially opened Sangam on 16th October, 1966. "Love through knowledge and understanding. This will be carried out in full measure by the young people who will fill this place and it is with deep joy in heart that I declare Sangam open". Lady B.P

The forms used in the design of the Sangam badge are universal in origin. It is based on the Chinese Yin/Yang that represent balance and harmony in the universe. In this design, they are arranged to suggest a junction, a place of meeting and mingling and flowing together like Sangam, The World Centre for Girl Guides and Girl Scouts. The design illustrates a continuous, symbolizing friendship without end, which is made at Sangam between Girl Guides and Girl Scouts from many lands who meets, live and work here together.

5. KUSAFIRI

In 2010, at the Africa Regional Conference, it was unanimously agreed that the Africa committee would explore opportunities to deliver world centre experience in Africa. In July 2011, during the 34th World Conference in Edinburg, Scotland a motion was passed to create and experimental 2 years Pilot project that could potentially lead to the creation of a "Fifth world centre in Africa Region"

In October 2015, the fifth world centre was given its new name 'Kusafiri'. Kusafiri means 'To Journey' in Swahili. Member organisation have been involved so far:



- 1. Ghana 2. South Africa
- 3. Rwanda 4. Kenya
- 5. Nigeria 6. Benin

The project was evaluated with result and recommendation presented at the 35th World Conference in Hong Kong 2014. The conference voted unanimously for the following:

The 5th World Centre pilot study has demonstrated the value of establishing a presence in Africa to host world centre international experience in line with WAGGGS VISION 2020.

The official announcement of new name was made by Nicola Grinstead, chair of the World Board and Rose Kiko, Africa region chair. The entire World Board were present for the occasion. It was chosen to represent and embody the girl guiding and girl scouting journey as we deliver training, workshop and sessions to our member throughout the Africa Region.
